AN ALUMNI PROJECT



Seventy-five years ago this month, construction began on the John H. Lehman school building. On December 20, of 1919, the Canton City Schools Board of Education had renamed North High School in honor of former teacher, principal, and superintendent as well as school board member, John H.Lehman, and announced plans for the first school in the Canton System to be built as a Junior High.

The West wing of Lehman bears the cornerstone dated 1920. While this wing was constructed, clases continued in the frame building that had been a Church of the Bretheren Bible College until it was purchases in 1910 by the Canton Schools. When the West end was completed, the old North High Building was razed and construction began on the East wing as well as the gym and auditorium sections.

It was November of 1923, when the formal dedication was held. A power failure delayed the dedication ceremonies for a time according to newspaper reports of the time. From 1923 through the late 1930's, Lehman students were in grades seven, eight, and nine. When Lehman was transformed into a Senior High School, many of these students stayed on as sophomores, juniors, and seniors.

Lehman's first graduating class commencement was held in the Spring of 1938. My mother was a member of the Classof 1940.

During the 1960's, it was abranch campus when Kent State University began the Stark County Branch Campus. Lehman was the place to go to college. That's when I was a student at Lehman. A proposal to build a new Lehman near Malone College was opposed by many and was never realized.

From 1976 to 1993, Lehman returned to its origin as a Junior High School, then in 1993 it was designated as a Middle School. The Alumni Association began to conduct some of their meetings there during 1994 and celebrated the first Annual Homecoming in the fall of 1994.

Prom now until November of 1998, we are observing the 75th ANNIVERSARY of "The School". The learning community of Lehman is still in operation although many changes have occurred in the years since its founding.

As Historian of the Alumni Association, as the daughter of a 1940 graduate, as the niece of a former Lehman student, as the cousin of a 1964 graduate, and as a nineteen year faculty member, I invite each former student or faculty member to take action on the Alumni Association's commitment to "Give 75 for the 75th."

Time,memories,materials, equipment, expertise,sweat, ideas,books,furniture, and/or money are most welcome. Contact me at 494-9607, or any other officer of the Association for more information. May we rededicate the John H.Lehman High School in November of 1938, as the outstanding community of learners that produced the many thousands of Lehman Alumni, and continues to do so.

Banks' football deeds remembered

Reprinted from the Free Press.

A bolt of lightning struck Lehman's gridders at their practice field in 1936 and took the life of Don Correll. The surviving Polar Bears dedicated the remainder of their schedule to the memory of their captain and teammate. One of these teammates was Clyde Banks who had been on the field that fateful day

Clyde Banks was the starting center on the tough Polar Bear line of 1937. It was Lehman's first year as a senior high school. Lehman finished the season undefeated and had ran roughshod over a number of opponents. One such victory was 101-0 over hapless Carrollton. Banks' performance was commended by Coach Jim Robinson.

Clyde was a star lineman on Lehman's 1938 gridiron edition. The ambitious schedule contained the powerhouse elevens of McKinley

and Massillon. His play against these and others earned Clyde a position on the Repository All-County teams. It


was an honor well-deserved. First Lt. Clyde Banks served his country as a navigator on a Flying Fortress during the conflict of World War II. He flew 51 combat missions. His campaign ribbons included the Purple Heart, the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross. They were

Immigrant earns GED, thirsts for more learning

CANTON — You can't help but wonder if an image of a tall glass of perfectly chilled grape-fruit juice might have passed through Paulina Clark's mind as she accepted her GED diploma

sne accepted her GED diploma Wednesday night. Twelve years ago, she was working as a waitress at an out-door cafe in her native Holland. An American gentleman asked first if she spoke English. She told him she did. Then, he asked if he might ask her a

She responded by telling him that she already knew just what he would ask her. When he prompted her to tell him, the following situation occurred.

"I know you're going to ask me to marry you, and the answer is yes," she said.

The American, Canton native John Clark, was taken aback. But he returned to the cafe the next day, and told her that, after thinking about it, he decided she had a good idea. All he had really wanted to ask her was whether the cafe served grape-

fruit juice, but he figured that getting a wife out of the request

was even better.
The couple came to America two weeks later and settled in Florida, where they lived for

Florida, where they lived for more than 10 years. And then, in 1993, they came to Canton, John's hometown. "And I started looking for-work. With very little formal education, I could only get very low-paying jobs," Mrs. Clark's aid.

People in Canton referred her to the Job Training Partnership and to local high school equivalency classes that are taught at the Stark County District Library. She took classes twice weekly and soon felt she was ready for the GED exam.

At the Canton City Schools graduation program, Mrs. Clark also was honored with a schol-arship, as she was one of the

"Now, I feel I can go after anything," Mrs. Clark said proudly. She plans to take her ACT college entrance exam Saturday.
"I want to study probably li-

brary science. But of course philosophy and geography also are very, very exciting to me," she said. Mrs. Clark acknowledges that the thrill of learning is enough pleasure for her.

"There are so many things I know nothing about," the 47-year-old said.

Looking back, she said it all seemed like destiny. Her husband is now legally blind and nearing his 75th birthday. Mrs. Clark thinks the directions she

chose were planned for her.
"I don't know. When I asked
him about the marriage, I said it without thinking. As though it came from a kind of subcon-scious level," she said. "Now I scrous lever, she said. Now it can make some more plans. I want to stay here in Ohio. I didn't like Florida as much. If you're not very elderly, or ill, it isn't all that good. Here, it's like I live with 'normal' people. And with my education. I plan to keep on growing."


