Zettie Sims, Principal of Lehman Midle School
There was a coach at Barberton High School in 1969 who
took an interest in Zettie Sims, challenged his interest in
sports, and headed him down a path that led to the former Lehman High School, now a middle school with over
750 students.

Graduating from Mount Union College in 1977, Sims joined the Canton City Schools and began his career at the Alternate School as a social studies teacher. Later he taught physical education at Hartford Elementary and was assistant principal at Hartford for one-half year. Then, he became the coordinator of the Multi-County Juvenile Attention Center, followed by a position of assistant principal at Souers Jr. High for five years. He was asked to go to Lehman in August of 1995 because as he stated, "...where there is trouble is seem to follow".

Lehman is no longer the school surrounded by family homes, but more of a transient neighborhood. Sims is trying to make it a place where the youngsters want to come to school.

The school is an old building, but the past year has seen some serious face-lifting to rooms; gym, and stage floors, and decorations in the hallways. A place of learning. He has had juvenile judges come in to talk with students, telling why they should not stray on the wrong side of the law, and his staff has tried an approach where good behavior and good attendance is rewarded. A student who stops to help another student may find that the principal has handed him a certificate for a free sandwich from a local fast food restaurant, or other similar reward.

Teachers took 180 students to Washington, D.C. recently as a reward, the students earnign their own money with fund raising projects. They have toured the London Candy factory, Pro Football Hall of Fame, taken a train ride through the Cuyahoga Valley National Park, and made a tour of the Cleveland Science Museum. Ten students are chosen each nine weeks to have lunch with teachers at a local restaurant. This fall the sixth grade students will go to Camp Muskingum for a fatt outing.

The D.A.R.E. and pregnancy prevention programs are in effect and Sims has been known to go to an absent student's home and tell him to get out of bed and get to school. He has appeared at a student's home at 6:30 p.m. to have a parental discussion about an unruly student. Video cameras are now mounted in the buses and he feels bad when he needs to show a film to convince a parent his or her child has been misbehaving and explain why he is being punished. Sims stated that his job is a "burn out" type of job, and when he gets to feeling down, he goes to sit in a class. When he sees students raising a hand to answer a question and enjoying the learning process, he is refreshed. Perhaps he really is making a difference.

Sims has used hids own money to fly to California to see how the educational program is working and feels it will come to this area in time.

Each month the school has a theme. It could be honesty, good manners, integrity, good behavior, random acts of kindness, all things which seem to have gone by the way in recent times. Uniforms are in the consideration stage. Tried in another Canton school, it has proven quite successful. And, although some students dislike the idea and their parents back them up, just as many parents are for the idea. Dark trousers or skirt with a light colored shirt or blouse are considerably cheaper than a "starter" jacket and some brands of tennis shoes. Trousers half-way down the hips on students have been met with duct tape and string, even if parents say it is O.K. It is NOT O.K. in school under Mr Sims' rules. Honor students take part in the Jazz Band and choir that go to different places to perform.

You could tell how proud Sims was of his students who participated in the local spelling bee, when Lehman had the number one spelling champ and three of the top eight students in the city, Cont'd on page 7

Don Abramson Leader of World Jewish Group

The service organization was founded in 1985, and the same year, Abramson founded a branch in San Francisco. "It is a volunteer organization of Jews helping non-Jews" he related.

Presently, in Vietnam, Abramson's organization is teaching doctors in outlying areas how to teach local residents to practice good primary medical care, especially women's, children's and prenatal care. American Jewish World Service does not go into an area and set up shop. Rather, it responds to requests from already established groups that need outside help. As part of its mission, revolving loan funds have been set up in Honduras and Gaza. These loans might be for as little as \$75 to \$100 for a woman to buy a sewing machine to make clothes for her family or for sale to others.

Power of the Pen


